Compassion & Conviction: What Do We Do With Our Bodies? Sermon Title: Curing Callousness

Main Point: The more we focus on ourselves, the less space there is in our lives to love God and love the people God blesses us with, especially our spouse if we're married.

## Sermon Notes:

- 1. Matthew 11:16-19 and other verses (Mark 4:10-12 for instance) cite that when we become repeatedly unresponsive to God's leading in our life, it impacts our ability to see what's true and real. This condition is called hardness of heart. Refusing to be open to God's leading is what caused religious groups like the Pharisees to see the miracles, signs and authoritative teaching of Jesus personally and still not believe in Him.
- 2. Unforgiveness, past relational issues, an inability to be vulnerable, and other reasons contribute to this condition in marriages. Hardness of heart is one of the ultimate reasons why a couple can say "I do" and years later face divorce.
- 3. The Christian who remains open to God's leading and responds rightly to "spousal accountability" works to prevent hardness of heart occuring in their marriage. Regardless if you are single or married, being intentional to listen and respond to God and others helps our hearts and minds remain pliable.
- 4. Pastor Trenton shared his story and ways he continues to let God keep his heart responsive. Let us all discuss ways to keep ourselves from having a hardened heart. What Jesus offers us is truly better than anything else we can make for ourselves!
